Dear First Church Family,

I hope that you are sticking with the Bible Recap reading plan. It is a challenge to stay committed and read every day, but it is worth it. The Bible is one of the main ways that we learn about the Lord. Stick with it even when it is difficult to understand. The investment will pay dividends in the long run.

We are quickly approaching a section of scripture where our commitment to the reading plan will be tested. There are a lot of chapters in the second half of Exodus, Leviticus, and Numbers that detail various laws, sacrifices, and instructions for building the temple. It is tempting to skim over these sections because they seem irrelevant to us now. Why do we need to know about the dimensions of the temple or the various kinds of sacrifices on this side of the cross?

These passages are important because they point beyond themselves. We have no plans to build a new tabernacle. We definitely do not need to offer any more sacrifices. But these things are important because they help us understand God's character and his purposes for this world.

Take the tabernacle for example. Eleven chapters (more than 25% of Exodus) is dedicated to describing the instructions and the construction of the tabernacle. Why does the Bible go into so much detail? The tabernacle (and later the temple) was the focal point of God's presence with his people. That is why there is so much garden and angelic imagery in the design. It was meant to remind people of the Garden of Eden, where God dwelt with Adam and Eve. The tabernacle was essentially a miniature, mobile Eden. A meeting place for God and his people. In the New Testament book of Hebrews, we learn that the Tabernacle was a shadow of the real thing in heaven. It was a model, along with the various customs and sacrifices, showing us what authentic, genuine worship looks like.

This is relevant for at least two reasons today. First, as Christians we believe that the people of God are the "temple of the Holy Spirit". In other words, the focal point of God's presence is not confined to a particular building in a particular location. Since the day of Pentecost in Acts 2, God's spirit dwells in every believer. The same manifest presence of God that filled the Holy of Holies now fills each one of us. What an incredible thought!

Second, the detail with which God describes the tabernacle shows us that the place where we worship God is important. The building is not the church, but the building we meet in is the place that God provides for his church to meet. We should care for it as a sacred trust. We should maintain it as a way to honor and glorify God.

I was particularly moved reading through this section during the painting project. It was a helpful reminder that maintaining that space and beautifying it is an act of worship. We are blessed to meet in the Ministry Center during the project, but I am already looking forward to being back in the sanctuary on Palm Sunday. The building, of course, is only a temporary structure. First Church would not cease to exist if that building was destroyed. We are the church, and we will continue to gather wherever and whenever we are able to meet.

But the building itself is important. It holds value, because it is the place that God's people have met for worship for generations. It is the place where countless faithful people worshiped, ministered, and served the Lord. Many saints spent their entire lives as members of this church. They were baptized, confirmed, married, and buried in that sanctuary. That is significant.

My heart breaks for the congregation of St. John's Catholic Church in Maria Stein. They lost their building in a fire. They would be the first to tell you that the building matters. They are also, however, a living testimony to the reality that the church is the people. The congregation survives, even if the building does not.

All that to say, I am so grateful for the work being done in the church building. They are making a ton of progress. We included some pictures later in the newsletter to show the progress. I am very much looking forward to the church gathering for worship in there on Palm Sunday.

I am also grateful for the study and application of God's word. These reflections all came after reading a few chapters about the tabernacle in Exodus. Who knew?!? (God did, of course!)

If you are considering membership, this is a great next step! Please contact Pastor Joel to learn more about what it means to be a member of First Church.





Church Painting Project Update

On February 13th, we officially reached the one-month mark of the painting project. A tremendous amount of work has been completed by Brian Brothers. The balcony level, ceiling, and main level of the sanctuary are now fully painted. Final touch-ups and artistic detail work are still to be completed, and Blanck Studios will be arriving soon to begin this phase of the project. Brian Brothers have also begun plaster repair and painting throughout all hallways and stairwells.
